

HISTORIC AND SCARCE NEW ORLEANS MINTED GOLD

The gold coins struck at the New Orleans Mint were struck in very limited quantities and most have been lost or damaged through the passage of time.

The \$5 gold coins, known as half eagles, and the \$10 gold coins, known as eagles, struck at New Orleans are extremely scarce today. In fact, 99% of the original mintage has been lost, damaged, or melted down.



3,251,984

Only 3,251,984 total \$5 and \$10 Gold Coins were originally struck at the New Orleans Mint.

27,538

Just 27,538 are known to have survived today. That's less than 1% of the original mintage!

Their scarcity and rich history make them some of the most desirable gold coins ever produced by the United States Mint.

- 3) They are wildly undervalued. Even though many of the New Orleans minted gold coins are comparable in rarity to the gold coins struck at the Carson City, Charlotte, and Dahlonega Mint, they can be acquired for significantly less money.
